



5th Sunday in Ordinary Time

Matthew 5:13-16

I recently learned why zebras have stripes. Scientists used to think it was for camouflage, but new research suggests something more interesting: the stripes help zebras blend in with one another. When a predator looks at a herd, the overlapping stripes make it hard to single out one animal. But if a researcher spray-paints a dot on just one zebra, predators lock on it and eventually attack. The lesson? In the wild, blending in is protection. Standing out can be dangerous.

Human beings are not so different. Most of us would rather blend in than stand out, especially when it comes to our faith. We know that giving bold witness to Jesus — through our words, values, or public choices — can make us targets for criticism, isolation, or judgment. That's why Jesus' words in today's Gospel are so challenging: **“You are the light of the world. A city set on a mountain cannot be hidden” (Matthew 5:14).**

A city on a hill draws attention. It also draws fire. But that's part of the cost of discipleship. Jesus doesn't call us to be tribal or boastful. He calls us to stand in the open with humble confidence, so that people might see our good deeds and glorify our Father in heaven. Today, let's ask for the courage not just to believe in Christ, but to be seen believing in him. — *Father John Muir* ©LPi








St Therese Reuniting Us As “One Nation, Under God” Prayer Service

How February 14 came to be celebrated as the feast for lovers is somewhat a mystery. What little is known of the feast's namesake can be attributed to the lives of two martyrs: one a priest, the other a bishop.

Their lives bear little resemblance to the contemporary holiday. The priest Valentine reportedly was beheaded in 269 by Emperor Claudius II. The bishop, known for healing, was martyred earlier. It's probable that a medieval custom of sending messages of love on this day merged later with the feast.

From The Earth Ministry:

Caution When Purchasing "Pet Friendly" Deicers

In a previous article, we suggested environmentally friendly alternatives to sodium chloride (i.e., salt based) deicers. In addition to the run off from salt deicers being harmful to plants, streams, and lakes, deicers containing salt can be very harmful to pets. The two most prevalent chloride compounds harm pets by irritating their paws or making them sick if they ingest the chlorides by licking their paws.



Be careful when purchasing deicers that are advertised as being "pet friendly." Some of them still contain salt, so check labeling carefully! Deicers that use Magnesium Chloride are available at most hardware and big box stores and are far safer for plants and animals. Calcium magnesium acetate (CMA) is considered the best overall choice for safely melting ice. Although more difficult to find, CMA-based products are non-toxic, and the minerals they contain can actually fertilize the plants they come into contact with. Good brands include Kind Melt, Safe Paw, Snow Joe MeltzGo and Natural Rapport Pet-Friendly Ice Melt.

Why Catholics Stand, Kneel, and Sit at Mass

The Theology in Every Posture

Most Catholics do these gestures automatically...

Stand. Sit. Kneel.

But very few know why we do them.

Yet every posture at Mass is a theological statement, a physical expression of what the soul believes.

Let's break it down in simple language, so anyone can understand, and so your scholars, priests, and bishops will appreciate the depth.

† When We Stand, We are a People Ready to Act

Standing is the posture of respect, readiness, and resurrection.

In ancient Israel, people stood before a king. At Mass, we stand because:

We are before the King of Kings.

We are a risen People, standing symbolizes resurrected life.

We are ready to listen and respond to God's Word.

This is why we stand:

- At the start of Mass
- During the Gospel
- During the Creed
- During the Lord's Prayer

Standing says:

"Speak, Lord. Your servant is ready."

† When We Sit, We are a People Who Receive and Listen

Sitting at Mass is not laziness.

It is the posture of a disciple learning from the Master.

In Scripture, rabbis taught while sitting. That's why Jesus "sat down and taught them" (Matt 5:1).

We sit because:

- We are listening to the Liturgy of the Word
- We are reflecting interiorly
- We are letting the Word sink into the heart

Sitting says: "Lord, teach me."

This is why we sit:

- During the First Reading
- During the Second Reading
- During the Homily
- During the Offertory

The posture itself is catechesis: We receive before we offer.

†When We Kneel, We are a People Who Worship

Kneeling is the most misunderstood posture, yet the most powerful.

In the Bible, people kneel only before God.

Not angels.

Not kings.

Only God.

So Catholics kneel during the Eucharistic Prayer because:

The bread and wine become the Body and Blood of Christ

Christ becomes truly, really, substantially present

We are before the Living God

Kneeling expresses:

- Adoration
- Humility
- Total surrender

It is the body saying:

"Lord, You alone are my God."

This is why we kneel:

- During the Consecration
- After the Holy, Holy, Holy
- Before receiving Communion (in many places)
- During silent adoration

Kneeling is the only fitting posture when Heaven touches earth.

†The Beauty of Catholic Worship

Mass is not random movement.

It is a sacred rhythm:

We stand to honor and respond

We sit to learn and receive

We kneel to worship and adore

Body and soul move together.

This is why the Catholic Mass is not just something you watch.

It is something you enter, with your whole being, mind, heart, and body.

†Final Takeaway

Every posture at Mass is a silent profession of faith:

Standing: I am ready to listen.

Sitting: I am ready to learn.

Kneeling: I am ready to adore.

The body prays with the soul.

St. Josephine Bakhita | February 8



The story of St. Josephine Bakhita (1869-1947) is a story that many people taken into slavery have experienced. Born in the Darfur region of Sudan, she was kidnapped at the age of 8 and sold into slavery many times. As she passed from owner to owner, she experienced the moral and physical humiliations associated with slavery. It was only at the age of 13 that her suffering was alleviated after she was bought for the Italian Consul in Sudan. It was here that she was fortunate to receive kindness, respect, and peace from her new master.

She was later handed over to the Canossian Sisters when she made the case that slavery had been outlawed in Italy for years. She was baptized and confirmed in the Catholic Church in 1890, where she took the name Josephine. She later entered the Institute of St. Magdalene of Canossa in 1893 and made her profession three years later.

St. Josephine Bakhita's next 50 years were spent serving people through cooking, sewing, embroidery, and housekeeping. She was a source of encouragement and her constant smile won people's hearts, as did her humility and simplicity. Today she is known as the patron saint of victims of modern slavery and human trafficking. ©LPi




